5	Module Overview
<p>This module will introduce you to the different intersections of language and society and outline the ways in which language can vary according to class, gender, and age. You will develop your understanding of how to collect, analyse and present language data and results in an ethically responsible and methodologically sound way. You will also examine how language is used to construct social identities, the role of language in wider contemporary society and how sociolinguistic research can be utilised in a non-academic context. You will develop your skills of visual communication, data analysis and data presentation, alongside a careful understanding of the body of research literature within sociolinguistics and how it informs your own work. This module will ultimately allow you to critically evaluate different approaches to the study of linguistic variation and apply your knowledge in designing a research project to investigate language in society.</p> <p>You will develop your knowledge through a series of lectures which are followed by seminars in which you will apply your understanding of the field through a range of practical activities. These might include: close readings of relevant texts, analysis of the local linguistic landscape, mini-presentations, forum posts, Twitter posts, application of theoretical and contextual documents, field trips and so on. Your formally taught sessions will be supported by pre-sessional learning activities delivered via Moodle and post-sessional reflection on the seminar's learning aims. Your wider independent learning will be characterised by the development of your creative and critical knowledge of the field which will be supported by the application and development of your research skills.</p>	

6	Indicative Content
<p>This module will introduce students to how language relates to issues of identity and social meaning, ethnicity, multilingualism and language choice, age, class, and gender. It will also discuss how language in different forms of traditional and social media and consider the role of language research in wider civil society</p>
