<p>With the study of ethics at its heart, this module draws on the wide range of intellectual disciplines which are used to understand and critique both longstanding and current issues with moral and political dimensions. It seeks to foster the capacity for independent thought, critical awareness of other perspectives, and an ability to think through the wider picture. In doing so the module assists in articulating the value of the humanities in a democracy as well as developing an appreciation of the values of citizenship, especially in terms of the challenges and opportunities which globalisation gives rise to. The module will enable you to write about contemporary moral and political issues for an educated general readership in a way that is both serious and engaging. As such, it forms a crucial link between the experience of academic study and its application to a range of graduate careers.</p> <p>Module delivery will be in a lecture and seminar format with the latter focusing on discussion of the moral aspects of selected contemporary issues. Formally taught sessions will be supported by pre-sessional learning activities delivered via Moodle and post-sessional reflection on the learning aims of the seminars. Wider independent learning will be supported by the application and development of research skills.</p>
