5 Module Overview

This module introduces you to the key debates that have been central to the development of film studies as a subject. The module begins by considering the development of film theory in its historical and critical traditions, before continuing to discuss a series of topics that will be relevant to both the module and your wider studies on the degree as a whole.

Some of the key areas you will study on the module include the contested nature of film authorship, as well as competing debates around screen stardom and modes of performativity. As well as covering issues of genre theory as part of your studies, you will also explore ideological and semiotic modes of enquiry as they apply to the study of cinema.

A further central section of the module will require you to engage with film studies long traditions of exploring representations on screen. As part of this consideration of film and representation you will analyse images of gender, sexuality and ethnicity across a range of film formats. The module concludes with an overview of more recent reception approaches to film which shift attention from the film text to archival and data driven sources.

6 Indicative Content

The module will consist of a weekly lecture and seminar/workshop, while weekly screenings are integrated into teaching times and assessment tasks.
