5 Module Overview

This module allows students the opportunity to develop a key understanding of policing and criminological concepts and theoretical approaches which have been developed in relation to models of policing. It will allow students an opportunity to examine and conceptualise some of the key debates around crime, policy, human rights, crime prevention, security, and policing. Students will be able to conceptualise and explain the subject matter and develop an understanding which informs debate about crime prevention, justice and security.

The module will allow students to have a better awareness and understanding of the practical and political processes of preventing and managing crime through policing mechanisms. Moreover, this means that students will be able to assess the values and practices of key agencies, such as the police, when thinking about appropriate responses to crime and deviance and be able to apply conceptions of human rights in order to evaluate efforts to prevent harm and ensure personal safety.
